Last of May, 1949

Dear Friends in the Kingsville Garden Club:

As I begin the first in a series of news letters to you, I extend every good wish for success in your own garden work, flower arranging, conservation project for every-member-compost-bed, civic beautification participation, and excellent programs next year, carefully planned to include a balance of projects which will lead to greater accomplishment by the club and personal satisfaction to each member. "All America is a Garden, Let's do Our Part in Kingsville".

The executive board met last Monday, discussing the various duties of each committee, and the part that each study group will play in the program building. Chris Wilson, Program Chairman, will be glad to have program plans from each group by June tenth; plans for an attractive yearbook are already under way. Ana May, Civic Chairman, has started intensive work for several other wonderful projects. Myrtle Ballard, Awards Chairman, is beginning an extensive clipping campaign, collecting and taking pictures on all our meetings and projects for our scrap book. If you can help her, please call 1460 J 1 — we want to keep an accurate history of this years work. She is investigating how our Club can strive for awards, State and National, in Year Book, Scrap Book, Flower Show, Horticulture both club and individuals, and Conservation. You all remember Mrs. F. A. Huwiler of Houston who gave us three days last December — She is now State Horticulture Chairman and will assist all of us in working for Awards in the State. Mrs. George Boyle, Mission, who spent one day with us in March, is the new Year Book State Chairman, and has promised us every help. Mrs. Paul Frinzel, Donna, who gave us our first Flower Arranging Clinic last October is the incoming State Chairman of Flower Shows, and your president is serving on her committee so that we will have an insight into what is expected of us with our November Flower Show, scheduled for the South Texas Fair & Exposition. Betsy Mantor will be Chairman of the Show and will have suggestions for planting, Flower Arranging and Horticulture at an early date. Let's all start planning toward an outstanding exhibition in November — planning, yes, but more important, PLANTING. Ruthie DeMauri, Horticulture Chairman, will soon have information from Mrs. Huwiler for all of you and reported this morning that Dr. Howe, head of the Texas A & I Agriculture Department, would give each of our yards a soil analysis if equipment can be set up this summer. He will let us know definitely by July. Isn't that Grand! Did you hear that Ruth Henderson, Riviera, rooted and gave away according to her diary, over 2,000 plants this Spring? She and Myrtle are both generous gardeners and good ones.

At this writing we have not had a report from the Casa Ricardo as to whether we can meet there. Also no reply about the possibility of Mrs. Daisy Steineger, Dallas, and Mrs. Howard Kittel, Ft. Worth, coming to us in September and October for clinics on Flower Arranging. They both told me they were very interested and we will have outstanding programs from them if they can come. Several of the groups have reported their plans for programs and they sound too good to be true — featuring Horticulture and Flower Arranging. Our first September meeting will cover Horticulture, Soil Analysis and Civic Beautification. An outstanding speaker has been contacted.

Miss Sadie Hatfield, Texas A & M Extension Department, has written that Miss Ruby Butts has copies of bulletins which you will be interested in reading at the Kleberg County Court House. Call her before going to see them as she is in the country a great deal of the time. There is material available on roses, insects and other related garden subjects. You may write for complete list of available publications from Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station, Texas, Circular #119.

Completing our fall work is the First Judging School, November 14 & 15, with Mrs. Jacobs, Horticulturist, Carrollton, Ky., and Mrs. Dorothy Biddle, Flower Show Practise and arranger, from Pleasantville, N.Y. They will teach two days, and exams will be given on the 16th. They are scheduled for Houston, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, and Mission for schools in South Texas. The price for any of these schools is \$5.50. You are not required to take the exams, but you will find that they are not hard and that you will learn more if you plan to take them. These schools are open to any interested person, but credit for work is only given members of affiliated clubs of Texas & National Council, Inc. "SUN-UP" Magazine has made our club a marvelous offer of 50% of all subscriptions to their magazine that we make. If any of you wish a subscription, 6 issues for \$1.00, bi-monthly, to a wonderful Texas Garden magazine, please call Catherine, Chris Wilson, Myrtle Ballard, and our club treasury will increase accordingly.

This is my first experience with a stencil and typing a long paper. Please overlook misspelling and mistakes. There is a lot more to learn to Garden Club work than meets the eye. So far I have written 67 letters in one month. Whewwww. Lots of fun this summer and good work and luck in your gardens.

For your information, and for that of all of those civic-minded groups and individuals whose cooperation we wish to secure in carrying out in our locality the program of improvement of the areas adjoining the highways of our county, we wish to give a brief summary of the principle phases of the program as it has been developed so far.

Our program in general now includes the following items:

1. Living Memorial

By concurrent Resolution a few years ago the Legislature has requested each county in Texas to adopt some particular flowering shrub or tree to stand as a "Living Honor" memorial to all of the citizens of that county who served in the armed forces during World War II, and asked that all property owners of the particular county plant the selected shrub or tree in their individual yards, as well as in public parks and around public buildings and along public roadsides.

2. Clean-Up Program

Encouraging the citizens who live along our highways and the business men who own property adjoining the business routes of these highways through our town and city, to clean up and beautify those properties.

3. Wild Flowers

Texas has a unique and unequalled heritage of lovely and distinctive wild flowers, which are rapidly being depleted by agricultural and industrial expansion. It is our hope that citizens can be encouraged to plant these seeds in their yards, and our public officials to do likewise in our public parks and playgrounds and along roadsides. The Landscape Division of the State Highway Department has shown that such a program is possible, as can be witnessed along all our highways in the spring of the year. (To protect our flowers we have a law, H.B. #47.)

4. Highway markers

During the Centennial celebration in 1935 and 1936 the Centennial Commission made an excellent start in placing proper markers at the principal historical spots along our highways. We propose that a further study be made of the many as yet unmarked historical or interesting beauty spots in our state, and that suitable markers identify them.

5. Advertising Signs

A study was made by the Texas Roadside Council of the Texas Highway department toward a practical correction of the present indiscriminate use of advertising signs along Federal, State and local highways, but no definite progress.

6. Control of Dumping and Unsightly Wrecking Yards.

There is now on the statute books legislation which prohibits the dumping of certain waste materials within 300 yards of public highways. This law needs some amendments and a great deal of enforcement.

You can see that this is an ambitious program and one which cannot be accomplished in a short time, but it is, nevertheless, one on which we can concentrate and try to get as much as possible accomplished this year. We must depend for its accomplishment largely on the efforts and the cooperation of the groups and individuals represented here today.

Dear Mrs. Flato:

To assist the Kingsville Highway Beautification Committee with their program of Improvement of Properties Adjacent to Highways, I have prepared a pamphlet which I am sending you under separate cover. In addition to the pamphlet, I am sending booklets and paper as follows:

For additional copies have paper mimeographed.

The booklets, which we recently discussed, showing plans and illustrations for improvement of Automobile Wrecking and Junk Yards, and improvement of grounds of small dwellings are not available at this time. I discussed the preparation of these booklets with Mr. Rodman, Assistant to Mr. Bennett, Engineer Traffic Services while in Austin recently. Mr. Rodman favors the preparation of these booklets, but he informed me that it may take some time before they are available.

To expedite the preparation of these booklets, may I suggest that the Chairman and members of the Kingsville Highway Beautification Committee send a letter to Mr. Fred T. Bennett, Engineer Traffic Services, Texas Highway Dept. Austin, Texas, and ask him to make the booklets available at an early date. As you know, the winter season is the most ideal one to undertake improvements of properties; at that time property owners are more receptive than during the summer months. When you write Mr. Bennett, it is best not to mention that I made the suggestion. I have prepared a Sample Letter to Mr. Bennett requesting the mentioned booklets. The enclosed letter is intended as an outline only and should not be copied.

You may be assured that the matter will receive careful consideration in the formulation of the proposed Zoning Ordinance.

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

Dear Garden Club Members:

As you know, a standard club requires that we have a club project each year. This year it has been decided that a compost heap in every member's yard will be our project.

Compost heaps produce leaf mold which is the rarest and most desirable of all soil conditioners. Leaves, grass clippings, vines, weeds, vegetable tops; even left overs from our tables, vegetables, meat scraps, egg shells, citrus fruit skins and dozens of other usually wasted materials about our homes, can be put in a compost heap to decompose to a crumbly mass of fertilizer which would cost two or three dollars a bushel at a dealers.

In this way we can return to the soil what we take out of it and feel that we are economically restoring our garden soil year after year.

Compost is dug into beds spread around shrubs and trees, spread over lawns, used as a mulch around plants during hot summer and used as a general rebuilding. This leaf mold has been proved to be more helpful to gardens than any commercial fertilizer.

The only way to have plenty of leaf mold is to start a compost heap in your own yard for year-round use. There are numbers of ways of making compost heaps but the simplest is to build it flat on the ground in layers, being sure it is in a protected out-of-the-way place where there is some sun and where the garbage collector will not cart it away.

First lay a six inch layer of leaves, clippings, weeds, vines etc; then a two inch layer of fresh barn yard manure with a good sprinkle of lime (not hydrated lime), then an inch of dirt and a good sprinkle of activo which is a chemical decayer that rushes the process. Then begin the layers all over again until you have used all your material. Push a pipe of wire or even a board straight into the middle of the pile to let the air circulate thru it. Then water the whole heap and keep it watered every day until it finally settles down (do not pack). After three weeks take a spade and turn it upside down, beginning at one end and turning a fourth of it at a time till it is all turned. Continue to keep it damp. In another four weeks turn again, and in another three weeks it will have returned to a sweet smelling crumbly soil for your own use.

Instead of a pile on the ground, some gardeners prefer to put it in a wire cage with a board at the bottom that is removable. They stir the layered material from the top and the finished compost falls to the bottom; they then remove the board at the bottom and rake the finished fertilizer out. Some make a wooden cabinet with rods at the bottom that they can shake when the compost is mature and it will fall to the ground under the cabinet.

But whatever method you use, the layers of green material, fresh manure, lime, dirt, and activo are the same. The pile must be kept damp, and you must keep adding to the pile the year round, layer after layer to always have plenty of food for your flowers, plants, and trees.

Remember Club Members, "There is never a leaf to burn".

Specializing Flower Shows Increasing, Says Visitor

Two new trends are noted in flower shows, said Mrs. Anne Wertsner Wood, field secretary of the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society of Philadelphia, in Dallas Tuesday.

The trends are toward (1) the specialized show, including roses, irises, peonies and other flowers, and (2) the show with a theme.

Mrs. Wood was the speaker at the refresher course sponsored by the Texas Garden Clubs, Inc., in the Sears, Roebuck auditorium, 5334 Ross. She is a nationally known authority and has staged flower shows throughout the country.

"The specialized show teaches a lot about a particular flower," she said, "its history, color, fragrance, season, the rarity of some specimen, and the flower's place in garden design, both in this and other countries."

Themes cover a multitude of ideas, presenting different periods, styles, and development, all educational and interesting.

She advocated asking everyone in the community to have a part in the flower show: growers, nurserymen, florists, both wholesale and retail, garden club members, and landscape architects.

"Put them on committees, and ask them to be judges," she urged. "They are experts in their lines and will be invaluable."

The speaker described the big flower shows of the East, especially those in Philadelphia and New York, which come simultaneously, so that the visitor can see both on one trip, and the Boston show, coming a week ahead of these two. In these shows the visitor can see plants grown by the most skilled growers in the country.

In the big flower shows, hobbyists have their place. Collectors of ivies, African violets, cacti and other plants can feature their entire collections as an exhibit.

Two important suggestions in staging a show were for ample aisle space, to permit the visitor to get about comfortably, and showing niche arrangements on one side of the room only, to avoid a bottleneck. The niches, she said, should stand fifty-two inches above the floor.

Declaring that a judge should take the first train out of town after judging, she laughingly went about the task of judging half a dozen flower arrangements made by women attending the lectures.

Then she showed slides of the same types of arrangements, many of them blue ribbon winners at large shows. She urged judges to attend schools and shows and to visit museums, in order to learn discrimination.

"If you are a good judge you won't need a scale of points. You can apply the same rules as those for making a cake. And above all, eliminate personal preferences, especially where colors are concerned."

The refresher course is required every three years for nationally accredited judges.

Mrs. G. Allen Woodward, who will demonstrate and lecture on flower arranging here on March 3 at San Pedro plantation, has lectured in Monterrey, Mexico City, Chicago, Los Angeles, San Francisco, and in Louisiana, Kentucky, Oklahoma and Texas and has done special decorations in such places as the famous Voisins at 275 Park Ave., N. Y.

She has won the most outstanding awards in competitions such as the National Flower shows in Houston and Dallas and the recent Philadelphia flower show.






