Securing 200 books on June 11, 1925, the A&I library has grown rapidly until today there are approximately 40,000 bound volumes and another 40,000 unbound magazines.



L. F. CONNELL, Professor of Economics and Chairman of Department of Economics, Geography, Sociology, and Director of Division of Arts and Sciences

When A&I opened in June, 1925, Prof. Connell was registrar and associate professor of social science.

For diversion, Prof. McKenzie works with needle-point and painting in oils, and she collects crystal, hand-painted art objects, china and antiques.






J. E. CONNER, Professor of History and Government and Chairman of History Department

Proud of the friends—and enemies—he has made, Prof. Conner's principal hobbies are people, history, and the Robert J. Kleberg Museum, which he collected.




Chairman of the A&I Athletic Council from 1929 to 1935, Dr. Manning served as publicity director for A&I from 1934 to 1936.






LOBOS 33


The twentieth annual Coronation of the Queen of the Kingdom of Lantana and her Ladies was held March 19 this year.

As contrasted with the usual four-page spread, The South Texan was a six-page newspaper several times this year.







## SEALE HALL HOUSE COUNCIL




