To the Students of A & I:  
Much success has been attained in all phases of the College during the year. The students are more mature and are more conscientious than in other years. The interest they have shown in their studies has been an inspiration to the faculty. The morale of the College has been good. A fine spirit of teamwork has been evidenced within both the faculty and the student body.

The construction of two new dormitories to accommodate three hundred additional students, the addition of fifty acres of valuable land to the main campus, the expansion of the facilities for teaching agriculture and for the operation of the college farm, the opening of the Citrus and Vegetable Training Center in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, and the placing of much valuable equipment in the laboratories are only a few indications of the rapid advancement toward the realization of a greater college to serve South Texas.

Truly, the year 1948-49 has been one of great opportunities for "winning spurs," but the mere "winning of spurs" is pointless. The intrinsic value is found in the use that is made of them after they are won. The understanding of nuclear fission is important, but to have value it must be applied. To be able to repeat the Golden Rule is one thing, but to develop the practical application of it among people is quite another.

Dr. Howe plays golf for relaxation.

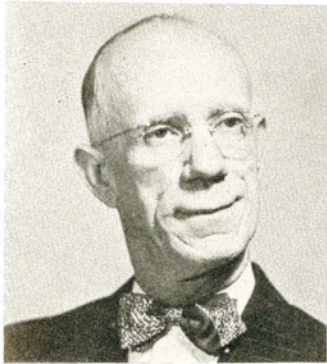


DR. D. THEODORE SKINNER, *Professor of Speech and Chairman of Speech Department*

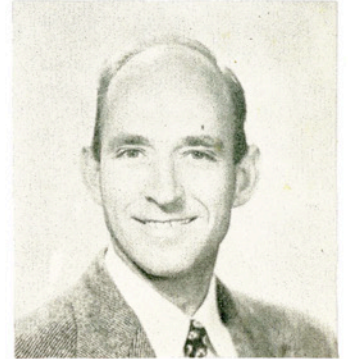
L. F. CONNELL, *Professor of Economics and Chairman of Department of Economics, Geography, Sociology, and Director of Division of Arts and Sciences*

When A&I opened in June, 1925, Prof. Connell was registrar and associate professor of social science.

Two and one-half years later, he was promoted to full professor and to head of the economics and sociology departments. Prof. Connell was then associate dean of the college for five years continuing as head of economic and sociology departments and the newly created geography departments. In 1947, Prof. Connell was appointed director of the Division of Arts and Sciences.

Prof. Connell served as president of the South Texas Division of the Texas State Teachers' Association in 1939. From 1931 through 1946, he was secretary-treasurer of that organization.

Golf is Prof. Connell's hobby, and he plays it regularly.



DR. ROBERT D. RHODE, *Professor of English and Chairman of English and Journalism Department*

**DR. J. R. MANNING**, *Professor of Business Administration and Director of Division of Business Administration*

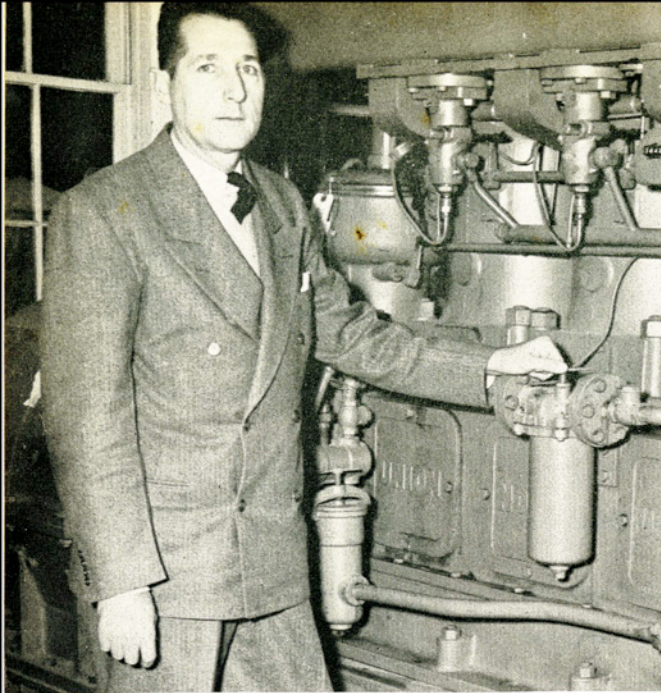
Chairman of the A&I Athletic Council from 1929 to 1935, Dr. Manning served as publicity director for A&I from 1934 to 1936.

A former cavalryman who keenly enjoyed riding horses, Prof. Bailey now gains pleasure from his work, painting and sculpturing.



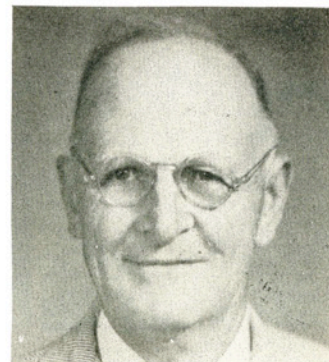
HUGH PORTER, *Professor of Mathematics and Chairman of Mathematics Department*

Too, Prof. Porter is fond of his own delectable angel-food cakes, parker-house rolls, and lemon jelly cakes.

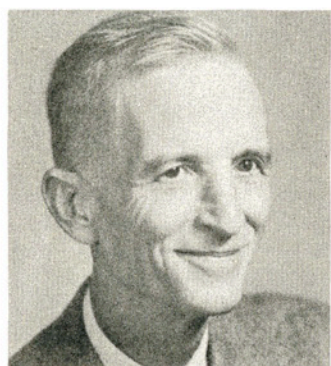




DEWEY A. MAYHEW, *Professor of HPE, Head Coach and Director of Athletics*

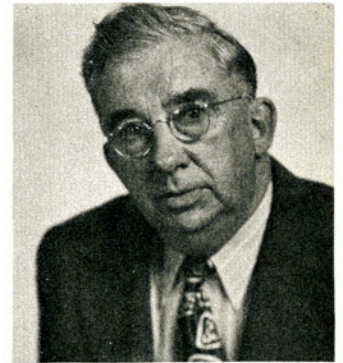

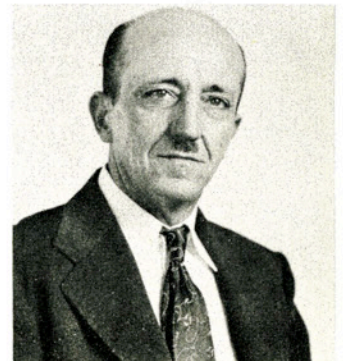

DR. ELDON D. BRINLEY, *Professor and Chairman of the Department of Health and Physical Education*

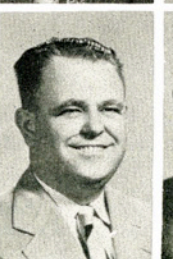

In 1936, after many months spent visiting colleges in the United States, a private concern began carrying out its proposal to recognize and publicize outstanding students in American Universities and Colleges. About six hundred schools subscribed to the idea in which a small percentage of upper classmen are chosen by a faculty committee. Scholarship, part taken in student activities and general personality and character are things taken into consideration. Students chosen for the honor may purchase an inscribed key and their names are entered in an annual publication, *Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities*. A job placement service is also offered. Eighteen students from A&I were chosen this year.

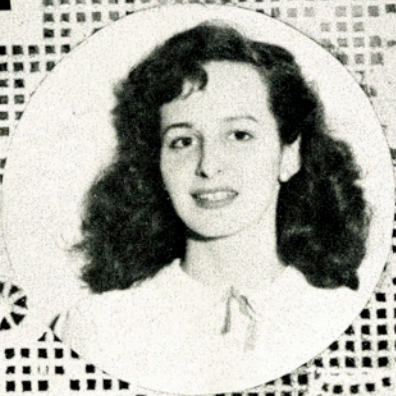
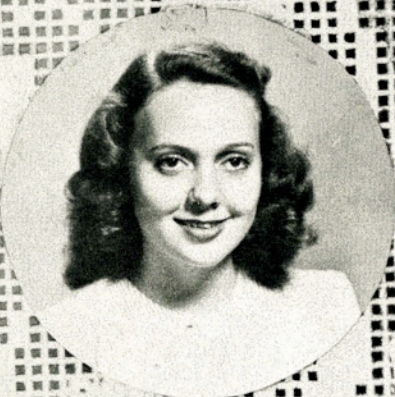
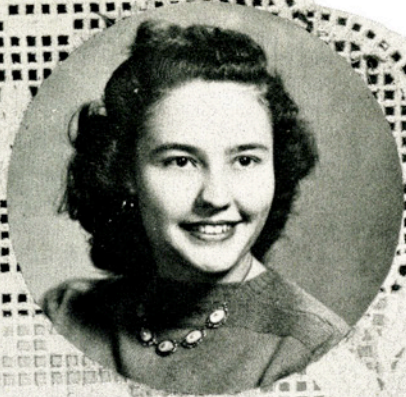


The twentieth annual Coronation of the Queen of the Kingdom of Lantana and her Ladies was held March 19 this year.

Containing 248 pages without advertising and five color sections, the 1949 El Rancho is quite an advancement from the meager beginnings of the college yearbook twenty-three years ago.

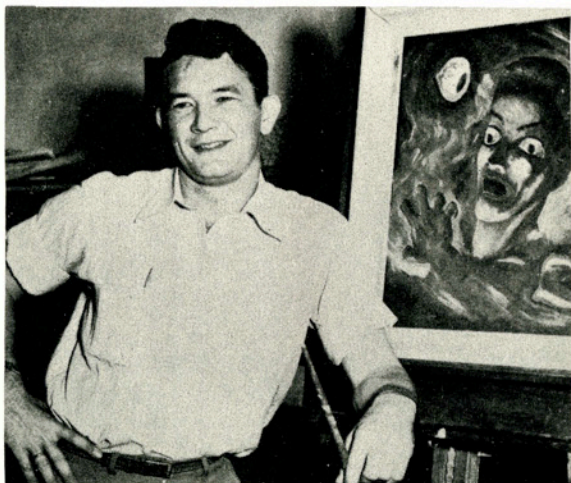
Printed in offset for the second year, the annual now employs a full-time photographer. No advertising was used this year as the charge per page was not high enough to warrant its use.

With regard to the spring deadline, the staff gave as complete a coverage of all campus events as was possible.



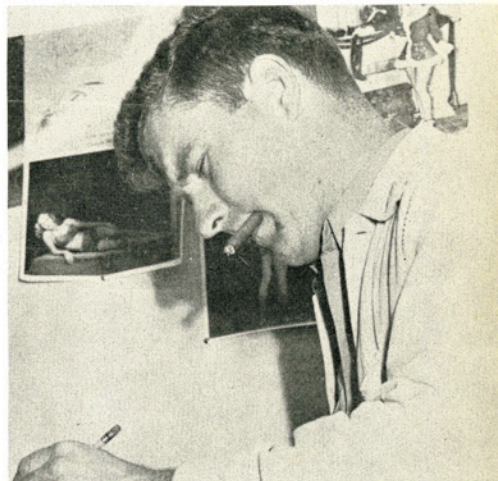

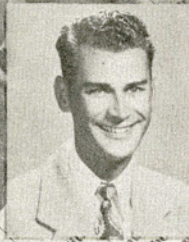

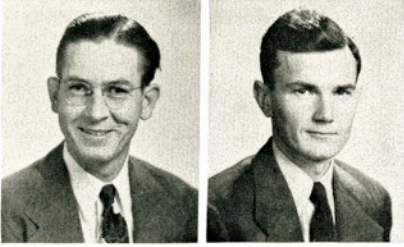




# The Rustler

Marshall Lynam, editor of the new publication, and his associate editor, Max Haddick, spent most of the summer gathering material and contacting advertisers for the first issue. The first issue, which came out with a large question mark in lieu of a name, was proof of the work put in on the book.



After having done a wonderful job as editor of the first issue, Lynam had to quit school; the sponsor, O. M. Montgomery, resigned to take a position in Florida; and Max Haddick admitted — regretfully — that he had indeed bit off more than he could chew, what with his other jobs, vacated his post.

These three major mishaps left the new youth all alone — and on nobody's door-step.

But, jaunty Sparky Cate, working admirably hard, rescued the new magazine, nourished it, gave it personality, and made it click by editing The Rustler deftly and devotedly. Patsy Crawford was drafted as the second associate editor. By projecting his super salesmanship, Patsy strengthened the financial bones of the magazine. Paula Kilby replaced Patsy in February.

Griff Moore is photograph editor; Bill Wilson replaced John Potter as business manager; Bill Duncan is book editor; and Alvin Cogdill, Phil Jensen, and Oscar Hrcir are art editors.

As outlined in the February issue, "The purpose of The Rustler staff is to present the best and the most enjoyable magazine possible with the material and facilities that are available . . . . We are actually pretty hot to put out a magazine that you like. We would like to have your criticisms and comments . . . ."

"The Rustler is a publication of the students of A&I College. A faculty advisory board for the magazine was appointed by President Poteet. This board is composed of Mr. Orlan Sawey of the English Department, Dr. Everett Gillis of the English Department, Mr. Robert Hawkins of the Art Department, Mr. Bill 'Scoop' Holmes of the Journalism Department, and Mr. Max Haddick of the Economics Department. The purpose of this board is to act in an advisory capacity in matters pertaining to Rustler policies and to make appointments to the staff on the recommendation of incumbent staff members. They also supervise the financial affairs of the magazine."

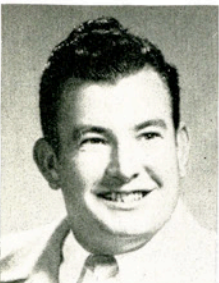

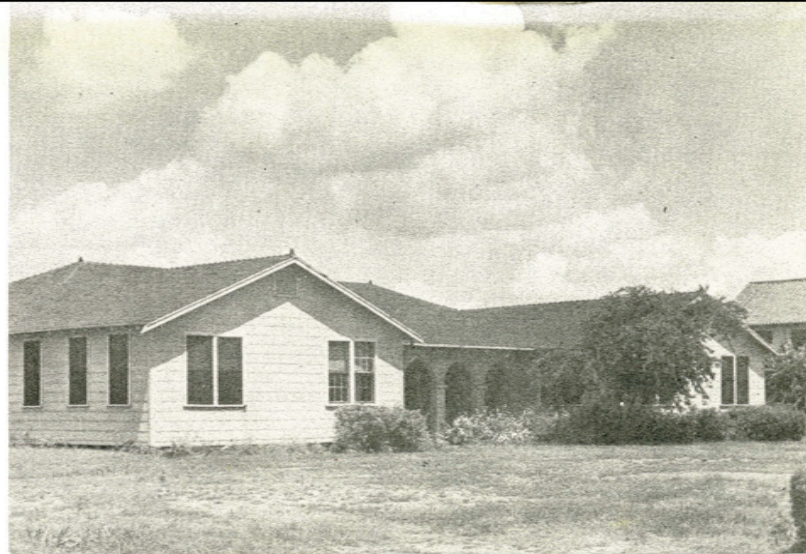


### BAND

LANTANA HALL HOUSE COUNCIL

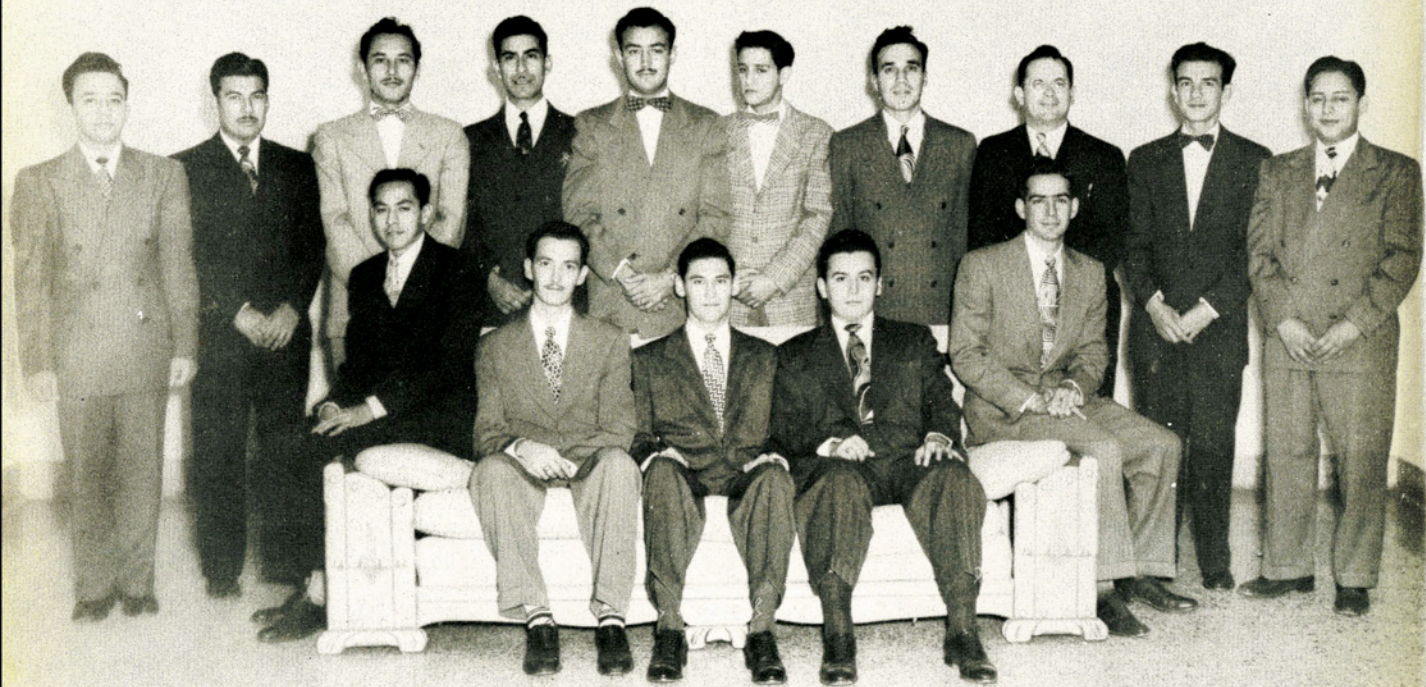
The Lantana Hall Council, formed in September 1947, strives to insure comradeship, understanding, and cooperation for residents of Lantana Hall through self-government.

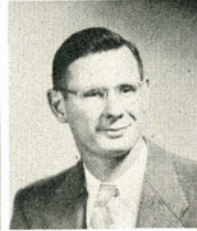

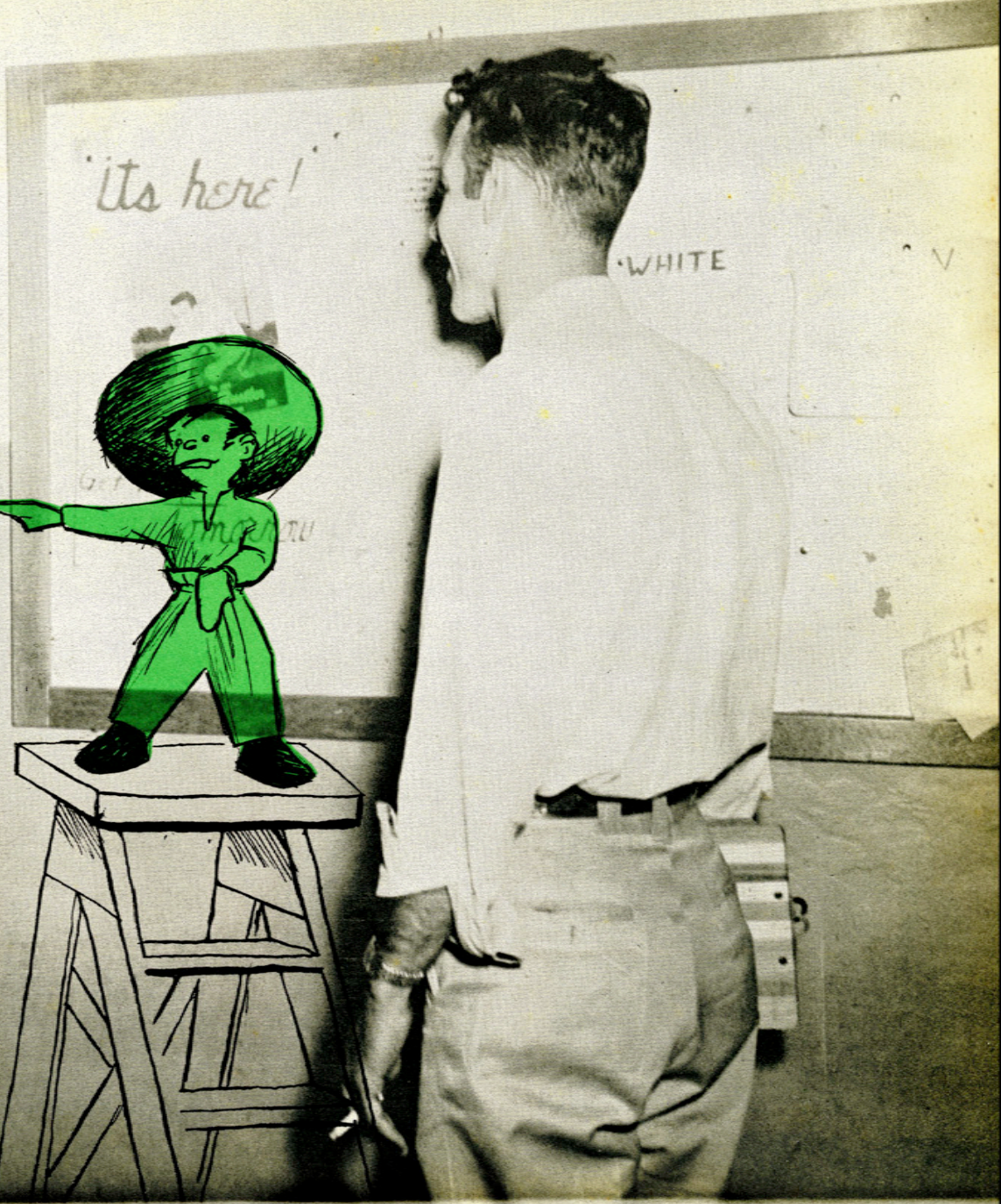
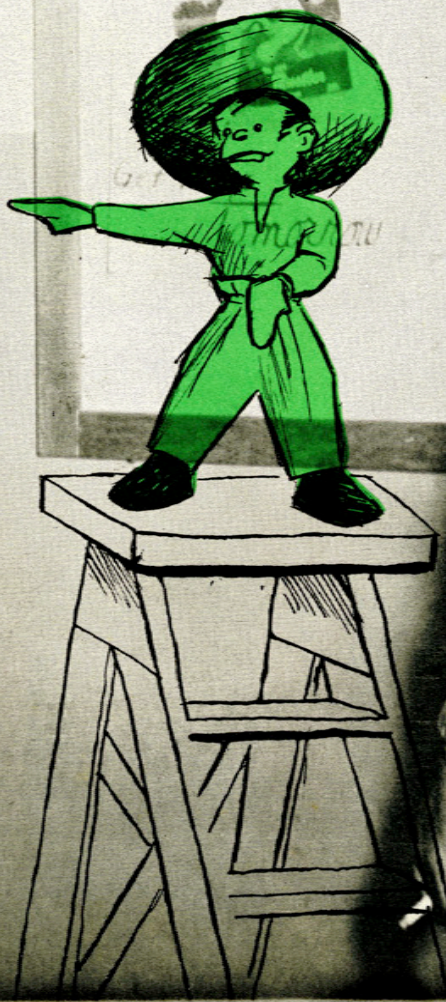
