Through rain, sleet and snow the mail from home continues to pass from postmistress Yolanda Rodriguez's hands to campus boxes.




"Rappin" is where it's at for KTAI's DeJuan Oakes, Linda Mosher and Ron Cervantes.
















"Good news! I got a call from the personnel office today about a campus job.





appointment when the final buzzer witnessed a 45-27 victory for the Bobcats.


"The night wasn't over though, Again, Ags and Greeks held parties and the Student Activities Board sponsored a River City dance in the Pub. What a weekend! Later...








