






College life offers more than simple solutions; it gives friends, craziness and commitments



















Getting physical seems to be "the thing" to do these days. How to shape-up slogans are blasted at you from everywhere—the radio, television, movies, books—Everywhere!





Sigma Chi Derby Days










Homecoming '83 is a weekend of fun
